

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) awards \$4 million grant to South Shore Child Guidance Center

SSCGC submitted a proposal and is approved to receive a \$4 million grant over a two year period as part of the federal expansion of Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic models. The funding will enable SSCGC to implement systems that increase access to behavioral health and substance use clinical services, streamline and coordinate care, and improve both behavioral health and physical health outcomes. We proudly share of this accomplishment and look forward to providing updates on the expansion of our clinic services.

114 Church Street, Freeport

We have closed on our new building at 114 Church Street in Freeport! With a \$3.5 million grant from the New York State Department of Health and a percentage of matching funds from foundations and private donors, the new building will offer the opportunity to provide our expanded set of services in a new, larger but warm and welcoming space. The location will allow SSCGC to continue providing effective treatment and vital services for the children, adults, and families of Freeport and the surrounding communities.

EPIC Long Island Residential Nurses honored by the United Way as Workforce Heroes


On June 16, the United Way of Long Island honored Workforce Heroes in an online event entitled, *A Virtual Salute; Honor a Hero*. Heroes were nominated from healthcare, retail, restaurant, non-profit, food grocery, public service, education, small businesses, and labor unions. The United Way showcased the honorees on a Wall of Heroes during a livestreamed event. All Heroes were awarded certificates and salute kits for their work.

EPIC Long Island nominated the Residential Nurses who have been instrumental in the care of the individuals during these challenging times. The following is a the writeup that was highlighted on the Wall of Heroes:

The residential nursing roles entail education, prevention, and support. Residential nurses are responsible for coordination of care provided by consultants and all members of the multidisciplinary team, as well as interpreting healthcare needs of the individuals in their care and educating members of the team. The EPIC Long Island Residential nurses serve as advocates and create an environment that supports good health practices. COVID-19 was not a battle they signed up for, but one for which they took up arms and fought. They chose selflessness over self-preservation in caring for all individuals and providing education and guidance to the staff. As needed, the residential nurses adjusted their hours, sometimes working long days to ensure the health and safety of the individuals and staff. In many circumstances, the nurses took personal time to communicate with physicians, hospital staff, and families to secure care and comfort for the hospitalized individuals.

Caring, empathy, flexibility, problem solving skills, & attention to detail are just a few qualities that a great nurse must possess, & every nurse on the EPIC Long Island Residential Nursing Team embodies these very qualities.

EFLI continues to offer monthly virtual trainings for the Seizure Recognition and First Aid Certification. These trainings are open to the public and for anyone who wants to know how to identify seizures and know what to do (and what NOT to do!) when someone has a seizure.
